




As a gesture of goodwill to our 2017 ASC host city, would you consider making a donation to one of the following non-profit organizations working on safety and justice issues in Philadelphia?



The Youth Sentencing & Reentry Project (YSRP) uses direct service and policy advocacy to transform the experiences of children prosecuted in the adult CJ system, and to ensure fair and thoughtful resentencing and reentry for individuals sentenced to life without parole as children (“juvenile lifers”). YSRP partners with court-involved youth and juvenile lifers, their families, and lawyers to develop holistic, humanizing narratives that mitigate the facts of each case; get cases transferred to the juvenile system or resentenced; and make crucial connections to community resources. Their ultimate goals are to keep children out of adult jails and prisons and to enhance the quality of representation juvenile lifers receive at resentencing, and as they prepare to reenter the community.

Mural Arts Philadelphia. For 30 years, Mural Arts has united artists and communities through a collaborative process, rooted in the traditions of mural-making, to create art that transforms public spaces and individual lives. One innovative program is “Restorative Justice,” which aims to unite neighbors who have been affected by crime or violence through shared creative expression. The program facilitates the forging of strong, positive bonds between incarcerated, formerly incarcerated, or at-risk individuals and their communities. The program emphasizes work readiness and gives creative voice to people who have consistently felt disconnected from society.
