JAPANESE PRISON OFFICIALS VISIT

Sponsored jointly by the U. S. Army Far East Command and the Institute for International Education, Takeshi KUNIO and Urashiro FURUHASHI will spend ninety-days studying prison administration in the United States. Mr. KUNIO is chief of the prison labor section and Mr. FURUHASHI is director of the correction and rehabilitation bureau of the Japanese prison system. Members of the Society are urged to extend every facility to Messrs KUNIO and FURUHASHI to make their stay in the United States a valuable and pleasant experience.

ELEVENTH DELINQUENCY CONTROL INSTITUTE CLASS GRADUATES

With the graduation of the Eleventh Class, Delinquency Control Institute, University of Southern California, 132 police officers have received the benefit of twelve-weeks intensive full-time study in the techniques of handling juvenile offenders. Captain Hugh Morgan, head of the Crime Prevention Bureau, Pasadena Police Department, and President of the Southern California Juvenile Officers' Association, awarded the certificates at the graduation banquet, June 22, 1950.

NEW POLICE PROGRAM SEEKS DIRECTOR AND INSTRUCTOR

The University of Louisville is seeking a Director at \$8,000 and an Instructor at \$6,000 for its new Carnegie-Rockefeller financed police training institute. NEW COURSES AT UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA

The Curriculum Advisory Committee of the University of Southern California has approved two new courses in the law enforcement program for the Fall semester. The new courses extend the university offerings into new fields and add considerably to the strength of the program. CORRECTIONAL ADMINISTRATION will cover the federal-state-and local systems of prisons, jails, and detention

facilities and will probably be taught by ROLAND WOOD, presently on the staff at the California Institution for Men at CHINO. PLANT PROTECTION AND INDUSTRIAL POLICING is a pioneering effort to study the problems in that wilderness known as private policing which with the exception of Jeremiah Shaloo's fine study of two decades ago, has received little academic attention. ALLAN SHARP, general manager of General Plant Protection Company and president of the California Association of Private Investigators, is the probable instructor.

FEDERAL INVESTIGATIONS

Current investigations of interest to members are being conducted by various agencies of the United States government into gambling, organized crime, and homosexuality among government employees. An excellent survey of gambling in the United States is contained in the May, 1950 issue of THE ANNALS of the American Academy of Political and Social Science.

SECRETARY-TREASURER VISITS HAWAII

Prof D. E. J. Mac Namara spent two weeks in the Hawaiian Islands during which he addressed the Honolulu Police Department, was guest of honor at a luncheon of the Hawaiian Armed Services Police, spoke to an assemblage of probation and parole officers in the courtroom of Judge Gerald Corbett, attended the sessions of the Hawaiian State Constitutional Convention dealing with the controversy over an elective or appointive judiciary (appointment finally won out), and talked to several non-professional groups on various criminological problems. Chief Dan LIU of the Honolulu Police Department asks to be remembered to all his friends in the Society.

SECOND INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS OF CRIMINOLOGY

DELINQUENT DUES

As of June 15, 1950 there are too many members delinquent in 1949 and 1950 dues. CAGED, a full length picture, deals with conditions in a women's prison and having attended the studio preview the editor feels it is somewhat sensationalized but still of value. LADIES OF THE LAW is a short on policewomen being filmed by RKO-Pathe with the cooperation of the New York Police Department as part of a series which began with "CRIME LAB". The film, INTERPOL, to be produced by Sam Engel and dealing with the activities of the International Criminal Police Commission has been delayed.
