



## 1ST ANNUAL CONFERENCE ON THE HUMAN FACTOR IN CYBERCRIME

Over the last two decades, the prevalence of cybercrime has increased rapidly and has become part of the everyday life of citizens. The planned Conference will focus on the human factor in cybercrimes and address the interaction between end-users, criminal actors, and the institutional environment. The 1st annual conference on the human factor in cybercrime will offer an opportunity to present cutting-edge research, introduce new projects and thought-provoking initiatives, and promote exchange among participants that will inform their ongoing research.

Scholars, researchers and practitioners from all disciplines are invited to propose papers in the formats detailed below. We welcome submissions from various disciplines, using a variety of theoretical and methodological approaches. Proposals may be submitted for individual presentations, full sessions, round tables and posters related to the conference theme. We also invite proposals for art exhibitions.

*Single Presentation* Proposals should include title, the presenter's name, institutional affiliation, keywords (ideally drawn from the list of topics below), and an abstract of up to 400 words. Abstracts should include theoretical rationale for their study, brief methodology, and findings.

*Panel Proposals* should include the title, the participants' names and institutional affiliations, keywords, a brief description of the panel, and a separate abstract for each presentation (up to 400 words each). Each panel is limited to 3-4 presentations.

*Round Table Proposals* are suitable for informal presentations of research in progress and ongoing collaborative projects. Proposals should include title, the participants' names and institutional affiliations, keywords, and an abstract not exceeding 400 words describing the research, the research methodology, findings where applicable, and questions that are emerging from the research.

*Poster Proposals* should include title, presenter's name, institutional affiliation, keywords and an abstract not exceeding 400 words. Posters should present work in progress or initial findings.



Anyone conducting research on issues related to the human factor in cybercrime is invited to submit their research for presentation at the upcoming 1<sup>st</sup> annual conference on the human factor in cybercrime. All substantive thematic areas of cybercrime will be considered including: different types of cybercrime: acts of trespass, fraud / theft, pornography, child sexual exploitation, and cyberviolence/IPV, causes of cybercrime criminality, the impact of victimization and the regulations and enforcement to address it.

The organizers will work directly with presenters to submit manuscripts to various journals as part of special edited issues on cybercrime, such as European Journal of Criminology or Global Crime. **Participating authors will be required to submit a full paper (no more than 30 pages Maximum) by 15 August, 2018.**
